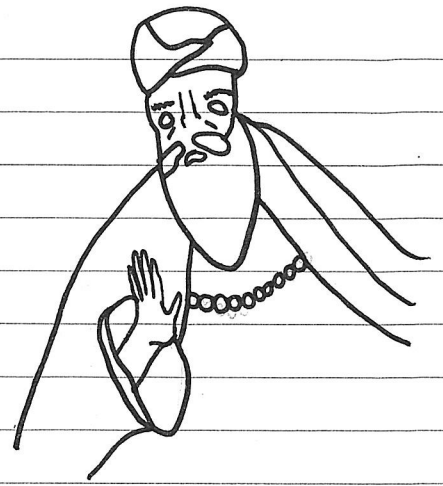
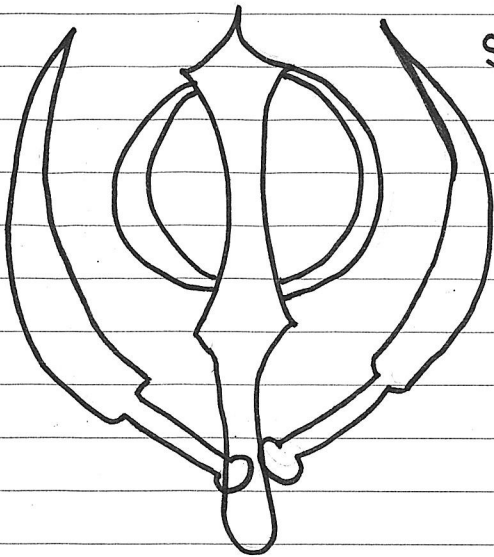

On our R.E trip we went to a Gurdwara located in Sheffield. It was a significantly large building, outside of the Gurdwara was a orange triangle flag which was called Nishaan Sahib + his means 'House of Guru'. The Gurdwara is the place of worship for Sikhism and the guru home. Whene we first entered the building we washed our hands and then the girls put their shoes and coat in one room and then so do the boys, some people brought their own scarfs in but if you didn't you would recieve one. Then we walked to the prayer room it was a very big room. The lady talked to us about the 5'ks which was : kara this is a steel bractlet which can not be removed it shows that Sikhs should not do anything that the guru would not approve off this is why the bractlet is always worn on the right hand and it is steel because it is a symbol of unbreakable attachment and commitment, the Kanga which is a wooden comb, Kaccha this is cotton underwear, Kirpan a stell sword and Kesh this means uncut hair this is because the hair is God's gift and it helps take pride in ones apperance. She showed us a photo of the golden temple this is one of the greatest attractions because it is a spiritual hub it is located in Amristar, the holtest temple in Sikh faith, the golden temple is so holy because it embodies the core principles of Sikhism, such as equality, humility, and community service. After we heard the priest read from the guru Granth Sahib then we was given some food and ate in the langar.
